

## WORSHIP NOTES: OCCASIONAL REFLECTIONS ON THE ELEMENTS OF WORSHIP

These reflections are written by Village's staff, and it is our hope that knowing a bit more about some of the individual components of the church service may help us to experience more fully the gifts of this time together.

### Prelude

written by Dr. Elisa Bickers

The prelude serves as a bridge between "out there" and "in here." During this musical moment, we can quiet the conversations of the week, and turn our hearts instead toward the potential of this hour of worship. After all, for the next 60 minutes, we will pray, sing, learn, consider and hope together. That's a big deal, considering all that surrounds us in this world, and so this is not a series of activities that we simply fall into. Whether the prelude is a rousing piece for hand bells, a meditation from the organ, or the offering of a soloist, the music has been thoughtfully selected and prepared to be a tool of transition. Let these few minutes guide your heart and mind into a place that is ripe for worship.

## THE CHURCH'S BOOK (Week of February 20, 2017)

The following daily Bible readings were written by Rev. Jenny McDevitt and are an offering for your own personal devotion. You are invited to read the text, think about the reflection and questions and allow these to lead you in a time of prayer. Pray for your own journey of faith. Pray for Village Church and our mission. Pray for God's world.

These are some of my "bible by heart" passages — the words of scripture that have engrained themselves on my heart. Consider these texts, and then consider what words have become (or might still become) your "bible by heart." Sometimes we need the Word of the Lord even when a bible is not lying around...

### **Monday, Feb. 20**

**Exodus 16**

This chapter tells the familiar story of the Israelites wandering in the wilderness and manna falling from the sky. This powerful text reminds us that God always provides — in ways that are extraordinary and ways that are ordinary.

### **Tuesday, Feb. 21**

**Psalms 23**

Psalms 23 is a familiar text, and it contains some of my favorite words. A fun bit of translation trivia for you: this psalm concludes by saying, "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow you all the days of your life..." *Follow* is a poor translation; *pursue* or *chase* is much truer to the original intent. "Surely goodness and mercy shall chase after you all the days of your life..." How does that change your understanding?

### **Wednesday, Feb. 22**

**Isaiah 41:10**

This is only one verse, but a great deal of comfort is found within. Read this verse and allow it to comfort you. Read this verse and share it with someone who needs to be comforted.

### **Thursday, Feb. 23**

**Matthew 1**

Full disclosure: I haven't committed the complete genealogy to memory, but I remember enough of it to find good news within every generation listed. This is not a boring history lesson; actually, if you are only interested in facts, some of the lineage presented is wrong. If you are interested in truth, however, this is the chapter for you. This family tree reminds us that from beginning to end, God is always present with God's people, and that each person has a role to play in our salvation history. That includes you. And all the rest of us, too.

### **Friday, Feb. 24**

**John 14**

Do not let your hearts be troubled; do not let them be afraid. I say these words more often than any others, perhaps. But read the entire chapter. Further on Jesus says, "I will not leave you orphaned." We are never alone. We are never alone. We are never alone. Thanks be to God.

### **Saturday, Feb. 25**

**Revelation 22**

The river of life runs through the city, and it nourishes the tree of life. The tree of life produces fruit, and its leaves are for the healing of the nations. This imagery is among my favorite in all of scripture. The leaves are for the healing of the nations. Pray for such healing. Pray for God's peace to be known in all the nations.
