ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

The organ prelude and opening hymn are traditional Palm Sunday fare: *All Glory, Laud, and Honor* has been used for centuries world-wide as a processional hymn, to which worshippers enter the Sanctuary waving palms to both recall and make current the narrative that the hymn describes. Indeed, the artful juxtaposition of the words "they" and "we" ties the singing congregation both to the past and the present. This text was written by Theodulph of Orleans in the ninth century (the tune is often called ST. THEODULPH), and the original text contains 38 stanzas! Gratefully, Bach's fantasia on this tune includes only one verse, and we will sing but four soon after.

The anthem at the 9:30 a.m. service brings together nearly every choral ensemble in Village's music ministry, from the wee singers to the more seasoned ones, and everyone in between. This surprising rendition of the familiar hymn *Nearer, My God, to Thee* introduces a newly-written Latin text, meant to underscore the original's emphasis on closeness to and trust in God. At first blush, this may seem an odd choice for Palm Sunday; then again, the Latin text (translated below) appropriately ushers us into Holy Week and the crucifixion of our Lord.

THE CHURCH'S BOOK (Week of April 10, 2017)

The following daily Bible readings were written by Rev. Len Carrell and are offered for your own personal devotion. You are invited to read the text, think about the reflection and questions and allow these to lead you in a time of prayer. Pray for your own journey of faith. Pray for Village Church and our mission. Pray for God's world.

Monday, April 10

John 12:1-8

Raising Lazarus from the dead gets Jesus in trouble. Caiaphas, the high priest, has put into action his plan to have Jesus killed. Then we find ourselves around Lazarus's table. Martha, of course, is serving. Lazarus is eating with his savior. And Mary does an amazing thing. She takes very expensive perfume and washes Jesus' feet and wipes them with her hair. "The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume." Acts of love can fill a room with sight, touch, taste, sound and smell. Judas is there in direct opposition to Mary's love. He wished to rob this moment of love. This week let us remember to fill each room with love.

Tuesday, April 11

John 12:12-19

On Sunday, with palm branches we celebrated Jesus' entry into the city of Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets. Palms were a symbol of national triumph and victory. Jesus fulfills the prophecy of Zechariah 9:9 entering the city in victory, yet humbled and riding a donkey. Crowds shout "Hosanna," which means "save us." John connects this scene and the crowds to the ones who witnessed Lazarus being raised from the dead. This moment is for all who are beginning to believe that Jesus is victor over sin and death. Even today we struggle to accept that Jesus will be raised on Easter morning, even though we know he will.

Wednesday, April 12

John 13:1-20

"Very truly, I tell you, whoever receives one whom I send receives me; and whoever receives me receives him who sent me." In Jesus' final meal with his disciples, he models what it means to love one another. Loving one another means serving one another, and serving one another is a vulnerable practice. Jesus ties a towel around himself, fills a basin with water, and washes his friends' feet. The first time I ever engaged in this vulnerable practice I was 40 years old. Kneeling down to wash a stranger's feet and then having someone else wash mine was intimidating and exhilarating.

Thursday, April 13

John 13:31-35

This is not the first commandment to love each other. What makes it new is what we celebrate each time we come to the Lord's Table, and how we are washed in the font of Easter promise. It is new because God's love remains with us and shapes our community in the life and death of Jesus. The day is coming when we will all be raised to new actions of love. In the incarnation, the Word became flesh and the mutual glorification of God and Jesus was enacted. What was revealed in Jesus' heart was the visible mystery of God's love in and for the whole world.

Friday, April 14

John 19:16-29

How could a day so bad be so good? The imagery is striking. Carrying his own cross upon his shoulder, crucified at a place called Golgotha meaning "Place of the Skull," an inscription to mock him reading "King of the Jews," soldiers dividing his seamless tunic, his last drink is a sponge of sour wine. Christ dwelled among us so he could die on a cross for us. This is the ultimate God-with-us moment. And even from the cross he teaches us we belong to one another.

Saturday, April 15

John 19:30

"It is finished." These were the last words of Jesus of Nazareth in John's gospel. It seems that according to John, the whole world falls silent so as you are able, keep silence this day.
