Media as Ministry

...as I was among the exiles by the river Chebar, the heavens were opened, and I saw visions of God. (Ezekiel 1:1)

The prophet Ezekiel begins his book with a bang. He describes a psychedelic (perhaps literally?) vision of half-human, half-animal creatures; of giant wings and even more giant wheels; of God's throne ablaze in light and glory. Ezekiel is a wonderfully odd book, and its first chapter is no exception, but what's the point?

Ezekiel is in exile in Babylon, experiencing a defining tragedy for the ancient Hebrew people. Ezekiel is probably in one of the first wave of exiles to be carried away from Jerusalem, and as he sits, a devastating siege is still ongoing. And yet his vision, full of colorful oddity, is also full of hope. The many wings and wheels that he sees surrounding God's throne, and thus God's presence, communicate mobility. God's throne, and thus God's presence, is on the move.

We have lived through our own time of chaos and upheaval in the past few years, and we, like Ezekiel, have found new ways to remind each other that God's presence goes with us. Up in the AV booth we don't have any half-human winged creatures, but we are awash in cords, cables, buttons, knobs, microphones, lights, amps, streams and graphics. As new and unknown as this technology can seem, I can't help but be compelled by how Ezekiel-ian this Media Ministry

endeavor really is. We work hard in the AV booth and the production studio to spread the same simple message that Ezekiel shouted from street corners and wrote down in a book: that God cannot be contained in a building. God's presence goes with us. I'm convinced that that message is as comforting to people today as it was to Ezekiel's people 2,500 years ago.

If we haven't had a chance to meet yet, I'm Alice Whitson, the soon to be ordained and installed associate pastor for Media Ministry. I have the privilege of serving as pastor to the online community, or as Pastor Tom likes to say, 'Village's extended family!' This call is as new to me as it is to the church and in honesty, I'm not sure what an online congregation is looking for from a church or a pastor. My guess, though, is that they are a lot like the people in the pews. They will have moments of joy and grief and need pastoral care; they will want to grow in their faith and need Christian formation; they will want to know and be known, and they will want to serve God by serving the world around them. I am both incredibly excited by the possibilities of this new world of ministry, and incredibly comforted by the long tradition of the gathered and scattered

people of God and the myriad of ways we remind one another that God is with us all the time and even still.

UPCOMING SERMONS

May 7-28: "Do I Have a Story for You!" The first stories in the Bible are both familiar as well as complicated. You know the names—Adam, Eve, Cain, Abel, as well as that story of the Tower of Babel. These old stories are not about people who lived at the beginning of humankind. They are stories about the whole human family. The ancient wisdom found in these first stories point to our place as well as our responsibilities in God's world. In this series, we will walk with God "at the time of the evening breeze." We will see what we can learn from a talking snake. We will discover how familiar the first brothers can be to us. And we will discover the risk to us all when "the whole earth had one language and the same words." These are stories our ancestors in the faith loved to tell. After all these generations, they still reveal truth about ourselves that we need to know. Rev. Tom Are, Jr. will preach this series.

June 4-25: "Why Church?" – Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka preaching. When you ask millennials and Gen Z why so few of them are in church, their critiques are consistent. Over and over, they say the church is full of judgmental hypocrites who are anti-women, anti-gay and anti-science. While this is true for some Christian churches, it is not true for all. In this preaching series, we will explore and respond to each of these criticisms as we seek to be even more faithful followers of Jesus Christ.

July 2-23: – Rev. Tom Are, Jr. preaching

July 30-Aug. 21: "The Gospel According to Pixar" – Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka preaching. Pixar Animation Studios is an American studio that since 1979 has produced over 30 feature films and numerous short films including two of the top 50 highest grossing films of all time. Pixar is known not only for their creative computer animation, but also for their powerful and captivating stories. A number of theologians have written books and articles on the gospel themes in Pixar films. In this preaching series, we will explore the Gospel of Jesus Christ through Pixar.

A Donkey's Tale

The metal donkey that has escorted many a Mary to the Chancel at Christmas time—and most recently, stepped in as a colt in the Palm Parade—has a wonderful story behind it. When Judy Cooper began working at Village Church as program coordinator more than 30 years ago, she worked with Carol Cowden, director of children's ministry. They were responsible for the family worship service on Christmas Eve. For several years,



Judy wrote the play. The birth of Jesus was told from different vantage points but always included the journey to Bethlehem and a donkey.

Judy shares, "In talking with my friend, Nancy McIntosh, I mentioned that I wished we had a fake donkey. Her husband Bill said, 'Tell me more.' I wanted it sturdy enough for a child to ride. Bill, who was a welder, went to work and made the donkey for the pageant. I was thrilled with the end product and especially glad it had wheels so a child could pull it."

The honor of playing Mary and Joseph was bestowed upon a sixth-grade girl and boy each year. Linda Alley remembers when her daughter, Kristen,

was given the role. "Kristen asked to be Mary in August, right after school started. Since she was the first to ask, she got the part. Kristen was one of the most serious Marys I have ever seen. She loved it."

"The donkey was used for the remainder of my time at Village," shares Judy. "I am thrilled to see it reappear. Bill is no longer living, but his wife, Nancy, was able to view the online service Palm Sunday when the donkey appeared with Pastor Melanie." Long after his original debut, Bill McIntosh's donkey is still bringing joy to children and adults alike.

Stephen Ministry—We are the “After People”

A Stephen Minister comes alongside you after the phone call with a serious diagnosis, after the layoff notice is delivered, after the divorce papers are filed, or after a spouse has passed. A Stephen Minister will provide Christian support and confidential care to navigate the difficult passages of life and to offer hope and healing.

A Stephen Minister completes an in-depth training course that sharpens the caring skills that are appropriate for a Christian caregiver. In addition, pastoral staff supervise and support the Stephen Minister and are available for guidance. A Stephen Minister does not solve problems, but listens without judgment as conversation is shared. At times, prayer is shared to communicate the most heartfelt of needs. Of highest priority is the Stephen Minister’s commitment to confidentiality.

The Stephen Ministry program began in St. Louis decades ago, and has grown to now be a presence in more than 180 Christian denominations in all 50 states and 30 countries. It is a meaningful part of the caregiving ministry in urban and rural churches, small and large congregations. Referring to Acts 6, the apostles commissioned Stephen to do acts of pastoral care along with a small group of other Christians. As he cared for others, Stephen witnessed to his faith as he offered hope and comfort. That is what Stephen Ministers do today.

The Stephen Ministry program at Village will commission six newly trained caregivers on June 4. Stephen Ministers are available at both Village Church campuses. Rev. Marsha Hansen to Retire as Rev. Tom Are's Long-Time Executive Assistant

Marsha Hansen has served as Rev. Tom Are's executive assistant for almost 13 years. On Good Friday, Tom announced Marsha's plans to retire on June 1 to spend more time with her husband and pursue other hobbies and interests. Tom said, "Marsha has been stellar in her work, gracious with her boss, and as the church's ordination vow states, she has been 'a friend among her colleagues in ministry.' She has not only done her job very faithfully, but she has made me better at mine. Daily she contributes to the spirit of joy at Village."

Kansas City is Marsha's hometown. She graduated from Bishop Miege High School and received her bachelor's degree in sociology from Kansas State University. She worked for 13 years for the U.S. Rice Trade Association in Houston. She moved back to Kansas City and worked for a manufacturing company and a commercial real estate company. "I was laid off during the Great Recession in 2008-2009," shared Marsha. "A few months after starting my new job search, my mother was diagnosed with brain cancer and given about six months to live. I decided to suspend my job search until she passed." But God had something else in mind.

Marsha had ties to Village Church. "My husband [Paul Middleton] has attended Village since the 70s. Paul and I have been together for 20 years (married for almost 12 years). I started coming to church with him. I had been active in the Village Career Center. A friend from that group encouraged me to pursue the executive assistant position despite my reservations with my mom's health. In that interview, I was shocked with Tom's response when I explained to him about my mother... 'anything can happen at any time. You just never know' ...and 'we would deal with it when it happened.' WOW! That alone was enough for me to know this would be a good place to land. And



almost 13 years later... (Yes, Village does pastoral care really well!!)"

About a year after she started, she and Paul were married in the Village Chapel and Tom officiated. "I like to tell people my boss married us at work on my day off."

"People seem to think that I keep Tom in order or run his church life. In truth, I do my best to run behind him and pick up some of the details. I help with Tom's memorial services, and Linda [Alley] and I back each other up as needed. After

retirement, I plan to join the Memorial Ushers Guild as I know how important it is to the members of this church community."

Marsha has enjoyed working closely with Tom. "It's been great! It always takes a while before you get really comfortable with someone and for the trust and the confidence to be there. When he trusted me to help edit his recent book, I knew that was significant. It was rewarding to be a part of that."

What's been the best part of the job? Marsha answered, "The amazing

people I've worked with and met along the way. I've never been employed anywhere that places such a high priority on relationships—with co-workers as well as those we serve. I'm grateful that the toughest things I've ever experienced in my life seem to have found a purpose here—to provide that extra insight and empathy as I listen and work with others dealing with similar circumstances. Thanks to so many who have shared their laughter, their concerns and their life with me. What a joy and privilege it's been!"
