#### 2022 Tidings of Joy Concerts to Feature the Kansas City Wind Symphony

The Kansas City Wind Symphony was founded in November of 1998 as a volunteer ensemble of professional and accomplished amateur musicians selected by competitive audition. It started at Village Presbyterian Church and has remained a member of the Village Church Arts



Alliance ever since. The ensemble is comprised of musicians from throughout the Kansas City metro area who are dedicated to the performance of modern and classic works for winds and percussion.

The group was founded by William Baker and Pam Smith Kelly, daughter of legendary Missouri composer Claude T. Smith. Dr. Phil Posey, conductor emeritus, became music director and conductor of the ensemble in 2001. Under Dr. Posey's baton, the Wind Symphony performed more than 100 concerts throughout the Kansas City region and across the state. In 2008, The ensemble went to New York for a performance in Carnegie Hall. In the fall of 2017, Dr. Langston Hemenway became conductor and music director of the Wind Symphony.

Will Breytspraak, director of music ministry at the Mission Campus, shares that the Kansas City Wind Symphony (KCWS) performed in Tidings of Joy many years ago, but it has not in recent years. Will said, "We've been interested in finding ways to help more of our Village Church community experience the delights of the Wind Symphony because this is a unique and special ensemble in Kansas City. These are some of the most fantastic musicians in Kansas City. They come to Village Church every week and practice in our Sanctuary on Sunday nights and give four concerts a year. Many times I've come to those

concerts and thought about how many of our people would really enjoy this music. It's so energetic, so beautiful, so colorful. They have had fantastic conductors in the past. Langston Hemenway brings a wonderful joy and knowledge of the repertoire and incredible conducting skill. He

also directs our Village Brass group. We've talked to Langston for two or three years that we'd like to some day do a Tidings of Joy together, and this is the year that it's finally happening," adds Will.

Langston Hemenway said, "We are most excited to be doing a Christmas concert! I have been the conductor of the KCWS for five years, and traditionally the ensemble has not done holiday concerts due to member conflicts, so I have never done a Christmas concert with the KC Wind Symphony. That, in addition to being able to collaborate with all the amazing choirs at Village, makes this an exciting opportunity for the Wind Symphony."

#### **About the Tidings Program**

The Kansas City Wind Symphony will perform with the choirs and a few pieces on its own. Langston notes, "The two pieces I have chosen for Tidings of Joy are 'Christmas Festival' by Leroy Anderson—the composer of 'Sleigh Ride' fame, and 'Russian Christmas Music' by Alfred Reed. This latter piece is an epic staple of the wind band repertoire. It is a treatment of traditional Russian folk music and celebrates the resilient spirit of a people who have had to endure hardship and tyrannical leadership for much of their history and continue to endure this hardship even now as their despotic leader plunges the country into a war that most Russian people abhor. This work serves as a prayer for peace in this troubled time."

Will shares, "Tidings of Joy also features the Tidings of Joy Chorus, which is the combined chorus of Village Choir, More Love Chorale members and Alegría Choir. The Alegría Choir will sing on its own, directed by Dr. Elisa Bickers. We also have a subgroup of the Village Choir that's called the Village Chamber Choir. Dr. Joshua Maize is conducting them. He's leading the chamber choir in a chant, which will be sung from the back of the Sanctuary with bells and chimes. He's also leading a playful and inventive 'The Holly and the lvy' that everyone is going to love.

I'm extremely excited to sing Moses Hogan's 'This Little Light of Mine,' which was commissioned for the St. Olaf Christmas Festival at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota in 2003. Cassandra Leon, one of our music interns, is going to sing the solo. It begins with a Kings Singers-like acapella section with rhythmic and playful content accompanying the soloist. Then it turns into a more traditional feeling spiritual with the kind of soulfulness that only comes from pain in the human experience. It ends with one of the most imaginative choral settings I've ever encountered, where the choir sings 'Shine. Shine. Shine. Let it shine!' on eight-part chords.

We're also singing 'In the Bleak Midwinter.' Jenny Hull, our director of children's music and assistant director at the Child & Family Development Center, is going to play the cello. The bass soloist will be Dr. Ron Witzke and intern bass soloist Evan Nelson. This arrangement evolves in ways that one might not expect as the composer fixates on certain words like 'kiss' and extends those words over measures and measures of episodic experiences for the listener and the singer.

Elisa Bickers is arranging the Ukrainian 'Carol of the Bells' for Alegría choir and the Wind Symphony."

Will adds, "There will also be our traditional congregational singing. This year the audience will get to sing 'God Rest You Merry Gentlemen,' which of course ends with 'Oh, Tidings of Comfort and Joy!"

The 22nd annual Tidings of Joy concerts will be at 3 & 6 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 18, in the Mission Campus Sanctuary. Admission is free. The performances will also be livestreamed at villagepres.org/online.

#### FEATHERING THE TURKEY RETURNS

## Child & Family Development Center Children Parade to the Food Pantry with a Bounty of Donations

The Village Church Child & Family Development Center calls it "Feathering the Turkey." The Center's food drive for the Village Food Pantry started in 2013. VCCFDC Assistant Director Jenny Hull said, "We didn't get to hold a food drive in 2020 or 2021, so we were excited to get back at it. In the past we had been collecting specific items for the Thanksgiving dinners that the Pantry distributes each year. This year we opened it up to all food items, plus personal hygiene items. We brought in a lot of soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes, shampoo, toilet paper and tissues—in addition to food donations.

Each classroom had a construction-paper turkey hanging in the lobby. Each day of the two-week food drive, we would count the items in the donation box for each room and add that number of feathers to the class's turkey. At the end of the drive, we brought in 1,475 items—or as the Food Pantry figures it, 1,038 pounds of donations. This was our highest donation to date. Our previous record had been 1070 items in 2017. We had to stop feathering the turkeys one day early as we ran out of feathers!"

On Nov. 18, the two Pre-K classes, the Sunflowers and Willows, loaded up carts, wheelbarrows and a baby crib to get all the items across the parking lot. We delivered them, got to see how the giant scale worked by weighing one of our carts of food, and then got to go back to the store to see where people shop for their food. On our way out the door, there were cars lined up, and we explained to the children that these were people coming to get the food that they donated. It was such a great experience to have them see what happens to their gifts beyond dropping them in the donation box. And even more so, to see what's happening in the building across the lot from them every day. Between the two Pre-K rooms, they contributed 1,029 of the 1,475 items.

Jenny adds, "The next day a late donation showed up for another classroom adding another 100 items to the total, pushing us up to 1,575. All in all, it was a very successful event."

Dennis Cobb, director of the Food Pantry, said, "When one of the kids came in the front door of the Pantry, she saw the large Village Church logo on the wall and said 'That's my church!' She repeated it several times as we toured the Pantry. It's wonderful to know that we're not only making a connection with our clients, we're also helping Village kids learn, at a young age, the kinds of things that mean 'church."







On Nov. 10, Mission Sewing's donation of 190 handmade dream bags was given to Project Warm Embrace with the Kansas Department of Children and Families (DCF)—destined for foster children in five counties in northeast Kansas. The bags can be used as a duffel to store a child's belongings as well as a pillowcase. Thank you, ladies; you show us what it means to care for "the least of these."

#### **Get Your 2023 Star Word**

Star Words for 2023 are available in worship on Jan. 1. Star Words have become a modern-day ritual related to Epiphany (Jan. 6), when the wise ones are believed to have reached the Christ child by following the star. Like the wise ones, we seek Jesus, too, trusting that God uses many paths to bring us closer to the Divine. Star Words are paper or wooden stars featuring one word related to our spiritual life in Christ. You are encouraged to simply draw a star out of the basket (rather than hunt through the basket for a word you like) and thus let the word choose you. The idea is to journey with your word through the coming year—to notice where it shows up, how it moves your heart and the ways it brings you closer to God.
