### **Good Vibrations at Village Church**

Have you noticed something wonderful happening at Village Church? More people are returning to church. One place that's especially evident is in our choirs. Will Breytspraak, director of music ministry at the Mission Campus says, "I've seen dozens of 'reunion moments' in the Village Choir. These are times when someone returns to

choir after years away from friends, and they hug and smile. It's as powerful as those great airport reunions you see or the prodigal son—not that anyone has done anything bad—just a reunion of joy that somehow eclipses the time and life lost in the overflowing love that is felt."

Will says something feels different this fall compared to last fall. "I see that people are no longer taking all of this for granted. Music, and a music family, are sacred gifts from God. It's changed the way we connect,

adding depth and presence. But it has also affected our ability to sing in a heartfelt, deeply spiritual way. We sing now like our lives depend on it."

"Increasingly, I am having conversations with those not ready to come back. You can tell they feel the pull of the choir family and the draw of the uniquely unconditional love that is Jesus' church and Village Church. It's palpable when you talk to several people who are inevitably coming back."

**Dr. Elisa Bickers**, associate director of music, has noticed these good vibrations reverberating through the music ensembles she leads. "It's wonderful to be back to 'regular' bell music with the Village Ringers," said Elisa.



"At the start of the pandemic, we played music that allowed us to be well apart from one another, not sharing bells. It was a neat challenge to figure out how to safely ring together, but it's great to be back at our typical setup in the handbell room, playing literature that fully uses each player's skills."

"The Alegría group is working on some great anthems for worship, plus exciting pieces for Tidings of Joy. We're excited to continue exploring this new phase of the group's format, with the rehearsal and singing schedule being such that even the busiest adults can hopefully carve out some time to make choral music in church."

"Last year, I felt the constant tummy-butterflies that come with making musical plans that may have to bend and flex (or cancel!) with whatever unforeseeable challenge the pandemic would bring. I was in open

and constant dialogue with the musicians in my ensembles, and they really helped me figure out how to proceed forward in such a time, in ways that kept everybody



safe and encouraged. We weathered that tough season together, and now I can feel the energy that they have to dive into our music-making with more confidence, now that we know so much more

about the virus and how to protect ourselves. There's absolutely nothing like the church members of Village Pres to make me feel like things are going to be okay. The greatest encouragement, pep talks, love and advice come from those good folks. I'm blessed to be part of this community."

**Dr. Josh Maize**, associate director of music, is delighted to begin a new season of music and fellowship with the

three ensembles he leads: More Love Chorale, Morning Bells and Village Voices. "We have some wonderful events, services and new music ahead!



There's a general feeling of excitement about being back together in a way that feels 'pre-pandemic.' I'm sensing folks are ready to return to the choirs and ensembles in a way that feels normal again. I also think everyone involved is even more engaged in connecting with one another. We were always checking in to see how people were doing during the pandemic, especially those who were ill. One of the results of that level of care was the building of relationships, which I think is continuing to grow even as we return to more relaxed in-person activities."

Josh shares, "I'm also excited to see that Village Church is committed to taking risks and investing in new ideas and projects with the goal of reaching more people. I think this demonstrates a strong desire by the church to engage the wider community and to nurture stronger personal connections within the congregation."

Our children's music ministry program has started back up again after a two-year hiatus. **Jenny Hull**, coordinator of children's music, said, "I am so excited to be singing



with the children again in the Morning Stars Choirs. It has been too long since we've heard their voices every week!

In addition, we have expanded our musical offerings for children and have more ways for them to get involved and be a part of the church's musical family." "Over the past couple of years, we have looked for new ways to stay involved with our youngest church friends—and in the process, have grown our Morning Stars program, which is truly exciting. Being able to talk to people face-to-face and welcoming them back in-person makes all the difference in the world. Last week I was walking around each of the Sunday morning classrooms, talking with children about joining us. In each room, someone would speak up and share with the other children about how much fun they had singing in church, being in costume in the musical or getting the chance to ring handbells—they were building excitement and recruiting their friends. I absolutely loved it."

What gives Jenny hope through all these challenging times? "I love that Village Church sees the promise and importance of our youngest church members. They are the future of the church, and providing them with the opportunities to lead ministry at this early age gives them a sense of belonging that will carry them through their youth. Having a place where they are accepted, loved and allowed to express themselves is so important; I am proud that Village Church values our children in that way!"

Destiny Ann Mermagen, our instrumental music

coordinator, is pleased to share that Village Players has grown leaps and bounds. "I'm most excited by the initiative players feel to create their own music and offerings. I'm always looking to match players and repertoire together, but





I've noticed a real enthusiasm for each member taking matters into their own hands and coming up with marvelous ideas. The most profound thing a leader can do is to inspire others to become their own leaders. As for Village Players Youth, the level has risen incredibly; we're offering a season of top-notch, famous works performed at a highly professional level.

Community among the church-going and concert-going crowd is what has kept Destiny going through these challenging times. "They genuinely care for one another and want what's best for each other. They show up at concerts and participate in the Good Word of our artistic offering. For musicians, these concerts are our way of offering up ourselves to God. And it's nice that other people want to be there to support them. These concerts/offerings are our own form of the sermons that you're used to hearing voiced on Sunday mornings."

**Cameron Rolling**, director of music ministry at the Antioch Campus, is most excited about two things:



The first being growth. "During my time as director of music [since December of 2021], both the chancel and handbell choirs have grown in

numbers, which makes me excited about the growth to come. Secondly, I am in the process of putting together a Messiah Sing-along at the church this Christmas season that will feature our own choir, our section leaders, chamber instruments, as well as anyone who wants to sing the chorus parts."

"We have two additional concerts coming up at Antioch: EncoreKC! performs at 7 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 20, and the Rezound! Handbell Ensemble is performing at 7 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 10. EncoreKC!'s artistic guests will be with the Youth Choir of Kansas City under the leadership of Ryan Main."

Cameron shared, "Leading this amazing group of people has been such a joy. I am glad the necessary measures are being taken to keep us going safely. Antioch is comprised of so many people including the singers, the ringers, the members and my fellow staff who make my job easy. It is also such a privilege and joy to have

Dr. Jan Kraybill as my 'partner in crime."

#### **Mental Illness Awareness**

Each year, millions of Americans face the reality of living with a mental health condition. Mental illness affects everyone directly or indirectly through interaction with families, friends and coworkers. If you or a loved one lives with mental illness, you are not alone—we work, love, perform, create, compete, laugh and inspire every day. During the first week of October, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) and supporters across the country raise awareness and fight discrimination through Mental Illness Awareness Week. Village Church invites you to be in prayer for all of God's children who deal with mental health issues.

#### Did you know?

- 1 in 5 U.S. adults experience mental illness each year
- 1 in 20 U.S. adults experience serious mental illness each year
- 1 in 6 U.S. youth aged 6-17 experience a mental health disorder each year

Anxiety disorders are the most prevalent—19% of U.S. adults live with anxiety. Depression is the second most prevalent at 8% of adults in the U.S.

Pastoral Care & Counseling at Village Church is here for you. We are partnering with the Kansas Missouri Mental Health Collaborative (KMMHC) to get affordable, accessible mental health care to more people in the Kansas City Metro. We offer weekly support groups for widowers and a Growing Through Grief class, which is offered four times per year. Pastors are available to pray with you when you are hospitalized, as well as meet one-on-one. Stephen Ministers are lay persons trained to offer Christ-centered, confidential care during challenging life circumstances. Our volunteers make phone calls, send cards and repurpose flowers for church members who could use a touch of beauty during a difficult time. #### Mandala Making: Grounding Your Story in Word, Color and Image



Mandala making is a meditative practice that invites you into deeper conversation with yourself. It is a way to allow the unconscious to communicate your desires, places that need healing, purpose and insights. It is also a self-care process that creates a place of calm and rightness in the midst of life's busyness. "Creating mandalas is a calming practice I've used in my own life, at retreats, with entrepreneurs, and with middle and high school students," says Jen Wewers, executive director of the Kansas Missouri Mental Health Collaborative, who is co-teaching this Village U class at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 25, with Rev. Melanie Hardison.

A mandala, which is Sanskrit for "circle," is a design believed to represent different aspects of the universe and/or self and can be used as an instrument of meditation, prayer and self-discovery. Mandalas can be found in all ancient cultures. In Christian art, mandalas are seen in frescos, mosaics and stained glass—for example, the ornate round Rose windows of Chartres Cathedral in Chartres, France.

But mandala making has humble origins and requires no prior experience with art. "When children first begin to draw, they most often begin with circles and spirals," says Jen. The trend of adult coloring has made it cool to doodle and color. Using Susan Fincher's book, "Creating Mandalas," participants will also explore a series of questions to uncover the meaning of their mandala. Carl Jung, the Swiss psychiatrist and psychoanalyst, said, "I sketched every morning in a notebook a small circular drawing, a mandala, which seemed to correspond to my inner situation at the time... Only gradually did I discover what the mandala really is: the Self, the wholeness of the personality, which if all goes well, is harmonious."

Jen likens the process to contemplative prayer which cultivates stillness and receptivity. "When you sit in silence with an open heart, there is a fresh opportunity to understand how the Spirit may be leading or speaking to you," she says.
