

## WORSHIP NOTES: OCCASIONAL REFLECTIONS ON THE ELEMENTS OF WORSHIP

These reflections are written by Village's staff, and it is our hope that knowing a bit more about some of the individual components of the church service may help us to experience more fully the gifts of this time together.

### **Prayers of the People**

written by Rev. Zach Walker

Sometimes called the "Pastoral Prayer," during these moments of quiet and spoken words, we offer prayers of gratitude, praise and intercession for those in our community of faith as well as the wider world. Although this is not a prayer spoken in unison, it is offered on behalf of the community by one person for and about local and worldwide concerns. It speaks to what is both intensely personal (illness, grief, struggles and joys) as well as broadly felt (events related to justice in communities far away, responsible use of Creation and its resources). In our time of prayer, we are drawn together as we recognize, reflect and pray for the different needs and realities of the world in which we live while residing in the hope of God's promises. After offering our own words, we end with the the words Jesus taught his disciples to pray, which we now call the Lord's Prayer.

Today's organ prelude and postlude are Baroque pieces based on the hymn version of The Lord's Prayer. Like our own prayers, The Lord's Prayer can sometimes be musically interpreted slowly and peacefully, and at other times with a more insistent conviction.

## THE CHURCH'S BOOK (Week of February 27, 2017)

The following daily Bible readings were written by Dr. Rodger Nishioka and are an offering for your own personal devotion. You are invited to read the text, think about the reflection and questions and allow these to lead you in a time of prayer. Pray for your own journey of faith. Pray for Village Church and our mission. Pray for God's world.

Monday, Feb. 27 Exodus 33:7-23

This reading comes in the midst of a tumultuous time in the relationship between God and the Hebrew people. In their wandering in the wilderness after Egypt and their waiting for Moses to come down from Mt. Sinai, the people decide to revert back to their idol-worshipping ways and create a golden calf. As a result, God is angered. So Moses sets up a tent for the worship of God and asks God for a new way of seeing God and God responds. As you prepare for the journey of Lent, what are some new ways you have seen God?

Tuesday, Feb. 28 1 King 19:9-18

After the triumph over the prophets of Baal, Elijah's life is threatened by an angry Queen Jezebel so he flees. He travels 40 days and nights (interesting number) and hides in a cave at Mt. Horeb. When God asks Elijah why he is hiding, Elijah responds that he is alone. So God tells Elijah to go out on the mountain and wait. Through a great wind, earthquake, fire and silence, God shows Elijah that he is not alone. Tomorrow is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, when Christians around the world will join together on our journey to the cross. You are not alone. Who is joining you on this journey?

Ash Wednesday, March 1 Joel 2:1-17

The first 11 verses of today's reading describe the coming of God's awesome judgment. The scene is terrifying and verse 11 asks a profound question — in the face of such terrible judgment, who can possibly endure it? The answer comes in the sudden change in tone in verses 12-17. In the face of God's righteous judgment, we come before God with all humility and contrition. We repent, we fast and we ask for God's forgiveness. As this Lenten journey begins, pray for God's forgiveness and remember from dust you have come and to dust you shall return.

Thursday, March 2 Jonah 3:1-10


A reluctant Jonah finally arrives in Nineveh, a great city that has turned from God. The prophet begins to preach and tells the citizens that God has seen their evil ways and is going to destroy the city. When the king and all the people hear this, they repent and are contrite. The king proclaims a fast for all the city and its animals. Together, they plead to God for mercy and then in a surprising turn, God changes God's mind and decides to forgive them instead of destroying the city. Bible scholars cite this story as one of several examples of God's compassion. How have you experienced God's compassion in your life?

Friday, March 3 Isaiah 58:1-12

For many faithful persons, the journey of Lent includes an element of self-denial as a token reminder of the incredible sacrifice that Jesus made for us all. Some choose to give up something like chocolate or alcohol. Some choose to fast for a day each week. Some choose to refrain from texting during meals. Today's reading reminds us that whatever we choose to not do means little if we continue in our selfish and self-centered ways. God is not interested in a token action of self-denial if the rest of our lives are not aligned with faithfulness to God. So along with deciding what you will not do during lent, decide what you will do so that God may call you the "repairer of the breach" and the "restorer of the streets to live in."

Saturday, March 4 Psalm 51

This song was sung by David after the prophet Nathan indicted David about his sinfulness. Over the ages, many have repeated these verses both in private and in public. These are heartfelt and powerful words. They are honest and wrenching. Knowing that our actions inform our speaking and our speaking inform our actions, recite verses 10-12 with your hands open and palms turned up. Spread your arms wide to show God that your heart is open then ask God to "create in me a clean heart and to restore a right spirit within me."


