Village Church Food Pantry & Clothes Closet Update

I have been the director of the Village Church Food Pantry and Clothes Closet for more than a year. On a daily basis, I am reminded how much we rely on the skills and the gifts given by our volunteers. Each month in 2022, an average of 165 individuals gave more than 1,500 hours of volunteer time to fulfill the mission of supporting our neighbors in need. Most of our volunteers are retired and able to commit to serving on the same shift each week. That continuity is the foundation of a smooth-running operation. And you might be surprised to know that only about half of our volunteers are associated with Village Church. The rest are giving-minded community members who appreciate and support the Pantry's care of those experiencing food insecurity.



The other "volunteers" we rely on are our donors—both financial and of food and goods. Right now, the Clothes Closet is low on items of all kinds: clothing (spring and summer), kitchen items, household goods, linens, towels, etc. Please look in your closets and cupboards and send those things you don't need our way. We have neighbors who will put them to good use.

Our volunteers and donors team up each day to make the Food Pantry and Clothes Closet a caring, active and vital ministry in the KC metro. Thank you to everyone who volunteered, donated and in so many other ways supported this work for the past 25 years!

Meet the Heritage Committee; Preserving Village Church History

Around 2008, Heritage Committee chair Judy Cooper first talked with Rev. Tom Are, Jr. about starting a task force to preserve the church's history. "Tom gave me permission to ask folks to serve on the task force," Judy recalled. "It was not long until we realized that this was not a task force with a beginning and an end.



So, I talked with Tom again and he said we should form a committee. Our first meeting as a Heritage Committee was in 2011. We have accomplished a lot over the past 12 years."

As Village Church approaches its 75th anniversary in February of 2024, the Heritage Committee is gathering pictures that will be used in a 75th-anniversary display. "We are also Zooming with the Records Archivist at the Presbyterian Historical Society and archivists from other PC(USA) churches on a regular basis to learn more about the importance of maintaining church records," said Judy. "We have sought the expertise from Village Church member Jamie Rees who is an archivist at the KU Medical Historical Records Center. Sherri and I visited with Anne Jones, the Johnson County Museum's director of collections, who showed us their system of storing and identifying their collections. The more we learn, the more excited we become about preserving the history of this great church!"

In the second creation story in Genesis, God gave the human the power to name all the creatures. With the naming comes the responsibility to care for all of earth's inhabitants. As we come upon Earth Day, we are reminded that God calls us by name to care for the earth and all her creatures.



April 23 – **Rev. Dr. Darren Kennedy is guest preaching.** Darren grew up in Village Church and is currently serving as a professor of theology and the academic dean at Evangelical Theological Seminary in Cairo, Egypt. He was ordained at Village and served as director of senior-high ministries from 1993-1996 (and worked as a summer intern in 1991-1992). Village Church has supported his work as a PC(USA) co-worker in Egypt since 1999. Darren studied the politics and economics of the Middle East as an undergraduate at Princeton University. He earned his M.Div. at Princeton Theological Seminary and later his Ph.D. from the University of Edinburgh. He is married to Rev. Dr. Elisabeth Kennedy. Their two boys were born in Cairo (Calvin in 2000 and Sammy in 2003).

April 30 – **"Jesus and the Least of These" – Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka preaching** In the Gospel of Matthew, we read of a time when all peoples of the earth will be judged not according to our wealth or power but according to how we treat a

special group of persons: the least of these. Why? Because in caring for the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the sick, and the prisoner, we care for Jesus himself.



May 7 – **Rev. Tom Are Jr. begins a new sermon series, "Do I Have a Story for You!"** The first stories in the Bible are both familiar as well as complicated. You know the names—Adam, Eve, Cain, Abel, as well as that story of the Tower of Babel. These old stories are not about people who lived at the beginning of humankind. They are stories about the whole human family. The ancient wisdom found in these first stories point to our place as well as our responsibilities in God's world. In this series, we will walk with God "at the time of the evening breeze." We will see what we can learn from a talking snake. We will discover how familiar the first brothers can be to us. And we will discover the risk to us all when "the whole earth had one language and the same words." These are stories our ancestors in the faith loved to tell. After all these generations, they still reveal truth about ourselves that we need to know. The series runs through May 28.

Village celebrated three extraordinary Presbyterian women as Honorary Life Members at the April 1 Celebration of Faithful Women.



Charlotte Davis has served in a variety of ministries at Village Church: as a ruling elder, deacon and on the following committees: Children and Family Ministry, Meneilly Visiting Scholar, Adult Faith Formation, Worship & Music and Building Beloved Community. Other groups that have been a critical part of her faith journey include the Discover Your Calling Task Force and Village Connect. Charlotte also serves as a Faxon School PAL. "Each opportunity to serve here has been a privilege—working with other women and men who seek to honor God and do our very best to build up this community of faith," Charlotte said. "At all times we've been aware that we stand on the shoulders of giants."

Charlotte was born in the Flint Hills of Kansas and is proud to be a fifth-generation steward of a piece of that tall-grass prairie. She earned her first degree in elementary education from Kansas State University; various other universities gave her additional opportunities to learn and grow. CELEBRATING EARTH DAY

Everyday Earth Day with Environmental Theologian & Author Rev. Dr. Patricia Tull

10 a.m.-noon Saturday, April 22 - Mission Campus

Scripture's ancient writers were keenly aware of their absolute dependence on, and interdependence with, the natural world that was their home. They developed a rich theology of creation, which people of faith are now reclaiming. As we do so, we discover not only joy in a powerful world beyond ourselves, but urgency to do all we can to assure its thriving—for the sake of those we love. Although many find environmental problems either too remote or too frightening to face, the actions needed to change our course are both practical and doable. From 10 a.m.-noon on Earth Day, guest speaker Rev. Dr. Patricia Tull will discuss what it looks like to make creation

care integral to everything we do as Christians and why it matters so urgently now. This free event will be in Friendship Hall-Mission Campus. There will also be an Electric Car Expo from noon-3 p.m. on Earth Day in the south parking lot.

Dr. Patricia (Trisha) Tull is A. B. Rhodes Professor Emerita of Hebrew Bible at Louisville Presbyterian Seminary and author of several books, including "Inhabiting Eden: Christians, the Bible and the Ecological Crisis" and the 2024-2025 Horizons Bible Study on environmental justice. A GreenFaith fellow, Climate Reality presenter, former program director for Hoosier Interfaith Power & Light and 2016 recipient of the William Gibson Eco-Justice Award, Dr. Tull devotes her life's work to environmental theology.
