For Such a Time As This

On Saturday, April 1, women will return to Friendship Hall at the Mission Campus to break bread and share stories of faith, fidelity and friendship. The Celebration of Faithful Women did not go away during the pandemic but was charged with becoming adaptable. The event was postponed in 2020. In 2021, we celebrated outdoors in lawn chairs in the south parking lot of the Mission Campus with boxed lunches. In 2022, we gathered indoors in the Sanctuary once again, but without refreshments. This year, the team is planning to return to the event's roots with a 10:30 a.m. gathering that will include a keynote speaker

and brunch catered by Chefs Andrea Bradley and Maria Radulescu in Friendship Hall.

Each spring we celebrate the relationships and contributions of Presbyterian women past and present while also raising up a few special ones. In 2023, we will honor Charlotte Davis, Desiree Reinke and Carol Solenberger as the newest Presbyterian Women honorary life members.

Our guest speaker will be Rev. Claudia Aguilar of Park Hill Congregational Church in Denver. Claudia is the sister of Village Church member Elsa Aguilar. Being bilingual, bicultural and binational is part of her call to build bridges among different groups of people. Claudia was born in Sonora, Mexico. She attended Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Georgia. She has led churches in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Atlanta and Denver.

Rev. Aguilar is interested in ecumenical and interfaith efforts to bring justice and peace to every sentient being. She is a certified yoga instructor and loves

music, dogs, cooking and baking. When not working, she is spending time in her garden with her husband Doug and their two dogs, hiking with friends, or trying to replicate authentic Mexican dishes with limited access to ingredients.

Her reflection will be on the story of Esther, "For Such a Time As This." To understand the importance of these six words that Mordecai speaks to the queen, we need to reach deeper into Esther's life. From Esther's history and those around her, we can learn how to faithfully respond to situations of crisis and use the resources that life has given us to help our communities.

Our goodwill beneficiary will be Village Church's Emergency Assistance Fund, which distributes rent and utility help to persons in the KC metro in need, most of whom are women and single mothers. For example, these funds helped keep 31 people safely housed in December 2022 and 24 people this past January.

In October of 1955, the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A voted in General Assembly to ordain women to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament.



On Oct. 24, 1956, the Cayuga-Syracuse Presbytery in New York ordained **Margaret Towner**, the first woman clergy of the denomination. The text of Towner's ordination charge included the phrase "don't be the pet lamb of the congregation," and she would occasionally be introduced at

presbytery meetings as "our pet lamb."

In a 2019 "Presbyterian Outlook" interview, Margaret, then 94, recalled opposition to her ordination from both men and women in the church. She received letters from ministers' wives who worried that women would take jobs away from their husbands and would be willing to be paid less. She also received letters from men who called her to repent and be saved. She chose not to answer those letters or "get into a dialogue with others about their opinions," she said. "I felt that an example of women in ministry would help break down barriers rather than debate."

In 1964, **Phyllis Matchette** became the first woman ever ordained as an elder at Village Presbyterian Church. She graduated from the University of Kansas with a degree in journalism. Phyllis and her husband joined Village Church in 1949. In 1965, she became director of

communication at Village Church and served in that capacity for 22 years. She is the author of the book "The Village Church Story" published in 1996. Phyllis passed away in 2010.


In 1980, **Rena Yocom**, a diaconal minister from the United Methodist Church, was called as minister of Adult Education at Village Church, becoming the first female pastor to serve at Village Church. In 1983, Rena was chosen as one of

22 church leaders to attend the Summit meeting between President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.



Jo Taliaferro was the first female from Village Church to attend seminary. Jo grew up at Village along with her sisters Jan Roach and Nancy Cantril. Nancy shared, "My sister Jo and her twin, Jan, were born two months premature. Excessive but lifesaving oxygen given at birth

caused Jo to develop retrolental fibroplasia. The vessels on her retina constricted and the retina was destroyed."

In "The Village Church Story," author Phyllis Matchette wrote, "From the beginning, 'Be thou my vision, oh Lord of my life,' was Jo's constant prayer." Phyllis wrote, "Gifted beyond sight, Jo had learned 'to handle a handicap without being handicapped."

Jo earned her Doctor of Ministry from Union Theological Seminary in 1980. She was called in 1982 to serve as interim minister with Youth and Their Families at Village. She went on to do advanced work in pastoral care. Now a retired pastor, Jo and her husband, Chris, live in Fearrington Village, Pittsboro, North Carolina.

"I am a Presbyterian pastor with a love for people, learning new things, playing and doing business on the computer and inclusiveness for all," said Jo. "My guide dog is one of my very best friends as is my husband, Chris. I preach well, participate in church activities (choir, worship and outreach), besides being a good steward of the planet, gardening, finding humor in each day and gratefully accepting life's challenges."



In 1984, **Rev. Diane Cooke** graduated from Union Theological Seminary and was ordained one month later to the Gospel Ministry at Village Church. She was the first ordained Presbyterian female pastor on permanent staff at Village Church. She joined Rev. Mike Vaughn

in ministering to Youth and Their Families. In 1989, she was made Village's minister of Evangelism.

In the decades since, Village Church has been blessed with the leadership and wisdom of several female pastors including, Revs. Diane Quaintance, Sue Dolguist, Jeanie Barnes, Glenda Watts, Meg Peery McLaughlin, Cynthia Holder Rich and Jenny McDevitt.



In the summer of 2022, our three female Village pastors ordained in the Presbyterian Church (USA), Rev. Melanie Hardison, pastor for pastoral care, Rev. Hallie Hottle, pastor for young adult ministry, and Rev. Sally S. Wright, pastor for pastoral care, posed next to the "Jesus trusted women. We do, too" banner at the Mission Campus.

"This is my fifth year working with children on Sunday mornings. The Lighthouse energizes me. I light up when greeting my kids, seeing their smiles and gobbling up their hugs. When planning my wedding, I knew that Mrs. Degginger had to be part of my special day. So on Dec. 18, 1976, my beloved Sunday School teacher helped me get dressed for my wedding. We laughed and cried as we recalled our adventures together. I blamed her for having to redo my makeup. When I got my photos, I made sure to send her one helping me getting dressed. Whether I am leading children's choir or Sunday School or now the Lighthouse, my goal is to be someone's Mrs. Degginger."
