Happy Birthday Village Church!

On Feb. 13, 2024, we celebrated the 75th anniversary of the founding of Village Presbyterian Church in Prairie Village. On Feb. 13, 1949, Village Church was organized with 282 charter members and 350 children in the basement in Sunday school. It all started as a grand experiment led by a dynamic young pastor, Rev. Dr. Bob Meneilly, and a dedicated congregation.

We gathered in the Mission Campus Sanctuary to celebrate Village's 75 years of faith, mission and good cheer. The program led us through the Village Church story. The script for the evening was written by several people, including Rev. Tom Are, Jr. Several members of the 75th Anniversary Celebration Committee also contributed. The committee included

Charlotte Davis and Ethan Harrington, co-chairs; Barb Brown, Kathy Collins, Nancy Gatewood, Carol Gee, Kim Higgins, Annette McLaughlin, Scott Stanley and Elizabeth Zakaryan. Charles Schultz served as program director who prepared storytellers of all ages.

Joy Biard, Dr. Bob Meneilly's daughter, gave the opening prayer. We heard from one of the few remaining Village Church charter members, Jean Francisco. She said in her video, "My husband and I joined the church on Feb. 13, 1949, and I have been a

part of this church family ever since... On that Sunday, every one of the memories that we are sharing today were still dreams, dreams of distant tomorrows. I have been here for the whole journey, and these stories give me hope for what can happen among us in the years to come."

We also heard from Village Church Clerk of Session, Henry Sewing. In 1966, Virginia and Don Sewing and their children moved to Fairway, Kansas, becoming the first Black family to make a home in this Johnson County community. Dr. Bob Meneilly knocked on their door and promised they would be welcome at Village Church. The Sewing family joined Village in 1972. Ethan Harrington, co-chair of the 75th Anniversary committee, said, "Let this

celebration be a springboard launching us into the next 75 years, with hearts set on continuing our work of being people of good cheer where all are welcome, singing praises to God, and serving our mission, our local community and world. Let us celebrate the past and look forward to the future, knowing this church has so much to offer."

Grateful Hearts for Village's Extraor

Rosemary Marshall has served as director of the Village Church Child & Family Development Center for the past 28 years. She began volunteering in the Village child care department in 1984 and soon came on staff. She has cared for generations of babies and toddlers at Village Church.

Last fall, Rosemary announced her plans to retire on May 31, 2024. She feels called to spend more time with her siblings and her husband, Bob, who is now retired. A churchwide retirement party for Rosemary will be from 5-6:30 p.m. on Friday, April 5, at the Child & Family Development Center at 9900 Mission Road.

Rosemary graduated from Kansas Newman College in Wichita, Kansas with a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education. She met her husband there and they married in 1975.

"I've always had a love for children and an interest in learning," shared Rosemary. "My mother was a teacher, so I decided that's what I was going to do. At the time, early childhood wasn't even on my radar. I worked part-time for an education lab developing education plans for children until November of 1976. Our first daughter, Patty, was born on Dec. 31."

Rosemary has another daughter, Molly, and a son, Michael. She came to Village Church as a stay-at-home mom and was able to bring her little boy with her to work. Her older girls were in school. All three of her children have worked at Village—Patty and Molly in the child care department and then at the Child & Family Development Center, and her son was a weekend custodian at the church. He would later work at the center. When her daughter Patty graduated from college, she became a teacher at the center for about seven years.

"In those early days at Village, I worked around my children's schedule. On Sundays, my husband would watch our kids while I worked in the nursery."

The Village Church Child & Family Development Center at 99th and Mission Road opened in 1995. Rosemary became director in 1996. Former children's ministry



director Judy Cooper said, "Rosemary's love for children is like no one else I know. When the first director of the day care center left unexpectedly, I asked Rosemary if she would help us out for a few weeks until we could hire a new director. She jumped right in and brought a sense of calm and stability to parents, staff, and most of all, the children at the center. After three weeks, the board offered her the position of director of the day care. She realized that our care of parents was important,

too. At her suggestion, we began to speak of a center for children and their families."

"Her goal was to make this day care the best in the area," adds Judy. "Her concern for children was obvious, but she also cares for the families as a whole. Rosemary will be greatly missed when she retires. However, she is leaving the center in the capable hands of people she has hired and trained through her 28 years there."



Rosemary recalls those early days. "The building was in such bad shape and the program was so new, but I saw the promise that I could do it. We had 60 kids at the time. Then it quickly went to 75 and then 95, which was building capacity. When we opened the Center in 2016, capacity jumped to 132."

Rosemary later received her master's in education from Saint Mary's College and an associate's degree in early-

childhood education from Johnson County Community College. Her dreams for the center have evolved over the years. "My initial dream was to provide care for children in a homelike, safe, fun place while parents worked, and to have nurturing staff. And I had to get the center up to licensing code.

My other goals were being culturally aware; we need to work with diverse people. We need to be accepting and welcoming. Other than a child's parents, we are the first people to be in care of children to assess developmentally appropriate milestones. I connected with infant/toddler services to get the help for parents to assess their children."

Rosemary and Jenny Hull have been preparing parents and children for Rosemary's approaching retirement since the fall. Jenny now has the title of director and Rosemary is associate director. "Jenny and I exchanged offices at the beginning of the school year.

Now they know that, visually, Jenny's in charge. Even though we shared the position, they see change and that I have backed away in little increments, but I haven't left them. It was important to let the children live through the transition, as well as Jenny, Peggy [Tingle, business director] and staff," added Rosemary.

When asked what she has loved most about her job, Rosemary said, "That these children have a love and an ability to trust. I've gotten them before they experience

the hard knocks of life. What I'm hoping to do is build that formation for them in their education and in their emotional intelligence, so they know that they are loved, that they are worthy, and they have something to contribute to society. No matter how little you are, you can give something and do something to help other people."

Village Church member Kathy Collins reflects on the time she entrusted Rosemary with the care of her daughter, Maddie. "Every new mother knows the stress of finding the perfect child care solution when the dreaded return-to-work day becomes a reality. The fear is real—*no one could possibly give my perfect child the appropriate level of love, care and attention!* Enter Rosemary Marshall. From the first moment she took Maddie from my arms, I knew she was different. The way in which she embraced every child, every family—both literally and figuratively—is something I will never forget.

Looking back, it was as if God created this perfect mother with equal parts of patience, love and kindness, and then threw in the smile, hugs and calmness for good measure. I don't know how many children's lives she has touched, but I do know she made all their lives better. We are all blessed to have had Rosemary care for our children, but more importantly, to have felt her love and friendship

for so many years. I am grateful beyond words. Congratulations on your retirement, sweet Rosemary!"

Rosemary brought Peggy Tingle on as the center's business director 20+ years ago. Peggy said, "Rosemary exemplifies love, joy, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. But to me and thousands of other parents in

our community, she exemplifies selfless commitment and wisdom to all children and families."

"I have learned so much from Rosemary," said Jenny Hull. "She has made me a better mom and a better teacher. I am humbled to be following in her footsteps, but I am confident knowing I was taught by the best. Rosemary has cared for generations of children, families and staff over the years—she leaves behind an incredible legacy of love."

The Shawnee Indian Mission is widely considered to be the most significant historic site in the State of Kansas. Did you know the first vote for Statehood happened in the Mission's East Building? Human migration—the coming together of cultures, human rights, slavery, Manifest Destiny, land use and more were all a part of the Mission's past. The history and plight of this country's indigenous peoples have been at the forefront of news in recent times. Twenty-two tribes attended the Mission after the Methodist Church established it on the existing site in 1839 as the first trade school in the new Louisiana Purchase territory.



Come learn more about the day-to-day life of the indigenous children who were educated at this Kansas State Historic Site. We invite you to join us on this pilgrimage in Village Church's own backyard—an opportunity to pray with our feet, deepening our understanding and faith with the hope of gaining new spiritual insights on how to live what we believe. New Advocacy Focus Formed within Social Justice Ministry

For many years, our Social Justice ministry has supported gun responsibility via organizations such as Moms Demand Action and Grandparents for Gun Safety. A recent social justice survey revealed gun safety as our number-one issue of interest for 2024, followed by climate change and voting rights. This survey reinforced the importance of our newly formed Village for Gun Sense. This group seeks to respond to expressed concerns and inquiries from Social Justice Ministry Committee members and congregants of Village asking the question, "What can we do about gun violence?"

At the 2022 General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), our denomination committed to a 10-year campaign to end gun violence, the Decade to End Gun Violence (2022-2032), and issued recommendations regarding our advocacy on gun-related legislation. Taking up the call, our new Village for Gun Sense group will seek:

- To participate in the Village Church Social Justice ministry's commitment of "Shaping our mission and ministry by 'defining moments' that embody our vision and demonstrate our faith."
- To respond to the PCUSA's call to end gun violence.
- To provide Village members who wish to act the opportunity to do so.
