#### The Rev. Tom Are Chapter Comes to an End at Village Church

On Sept. 12, Rev. Tom Are made the announcement that after nearly 20 years of ministry at Village Church, he was leaving to becoming interim senior pastor at Fourth Presbyterian Church in Chicago.

Tom said, "Village, you are strong and faithful and a shining light...we have done good things together and you will be the highlight of my ministry. You taught me how to be a pastor and a leader. And you loved my children and my wife. Change can be good. I trust it will be good for all of us. But I will miss you deeply. With Rodger [Nishioka] here, there are no questions about the quality of pastoral leadership in

the next chapter. He is an extraordinary leader of this pastoral team."

In his final sermon delivered on Sunday, Oct. 15, Tom preached, "I see the commitment in your heart to do the good that is yours to do. And I don't know where that will lead you, but I know it will be good. There are more stories that are coming, and I don't know who will tell

them or what they will describe, but they will again describe glimpses of that day that God has promised us. And God will be faithful. It's a day when all that has gone wrong will be made right."

At the Oct. 17 farewell gathering for Tom and Carol Are, Lighthouse Kids' teachers gave special thanks to Carol Are for her many years of teaching children on Sunday morning. "Carol always went above and beyond in the classroom... praying wholeheartedly with the kids about things that were truly affecting their lives, their joys and concerns... She has shined God's light on more kids than we can count."

Tom and Carol's daughter,

Rev. Sarah Are Speed, spoke directly to her dad, "When violence has threatened to break us and the pandemic isolate us, you kept preaching hope. And that is an accomplishment of

spiritual importance. I also want to lift up your intentional effort

to lead in a way that has kept people at the table. We live in a world that often says this is right and this is wrong. And in your 20 years at Village, I have watched you resist the trap of dualistic thinking in an effort to create an environment where all of us can learn from each other."

George Satterlee was chair of the Pastor Nominating Committee that brought

Tom and Carol to Village Church. George said, "Thank you, Tom, for 20 years of loving us and serving us and helping us know what it is to do Christ's work in the world."

Tom's closing words were, "Thank you for trusting me. You have been a great church to me. You are an amazing congregation. Unforgettable. I love you!"

#### A Letter From Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka

Dag Hammarskjold, Nobel Peace Prize laureate and 2nd secretary-general of the United Nations said, "For all that has been, thank you. For all that is to come, Yes!"

I can relate. As we said goodbye to our pastor of nearly 20 years, our hearts are full of gratitude to Tom and Carol and of course, to God. And as we look to the future that the Holy Spirit is unfolding for us, all we can say is, "Yes!"

Eight years ago, when I said I felt called to come serve here at Village, you remarkably said, "Yes!" Then this past January, when it was proposed that Tom and I serve as co-pastors, you said, "Yes!" again. Little did we know that eight months later, Tom would be called to serve as the interim senior pastor of Fourth Presbyterian Church in Chicago.

Last May, when Rev. Shannon Kershner felt called by God to leave Fourth Church as their senior pastor, Tom and I were both surprised. Shannon has been in a pastors' group with Tom for years and was a former student of mine at Columbia Seminary. When Fourth Church decided to seek an interim senior pastor, someone to lead them while they conducted a lengthy search for a permanent, long-term pastor, I was certain they would ask Tom if he was interested. He and I began to pray together to seek God's guidance. Mostly we prayed that God's will would be made clear.

So, when their interim pastor search committee reached out to Tom in June, neither of us were surprised. Tom had a lot of questions. So did they, of course. Then things went quiet in the summer so both Tom and I thought the search committee had moved on to other candidates. Turns out, they were struggling to find time to meet. Their search started up in earnest in the middle of August and further conversations took place.

I have long thought it a remarkable thing when a group of disparate people comes together as one and agrees on a single candidate. I have always thought it a "God thing." For a call to be true and real, both the committee and the individual have to agree that God is calling. Both the committee and the pastor have to be able to see a possible future together. I remember talking with Tom and asking him, "Can you see yourself there? In their pulpit preaching? With their staff? With their people?" And smiling when he quietly and thoughtfully said, "Yes." When the interim search committee called and said they were unanimous that Tom was their choice (and believe me, this is Fourth Church of Chicago—they had MANY other choices), I knew he and Carol were going to go.

I know for some it seemed fast, and in some ways it was. But for me, because I had been living with this possibility for several months, it did not feel rushed. It was God's timing and I have come to rely on that over and over.

Truthfully, Fourth Chicago wanted Tom to come right away, and he said he could not. He knew he had to give us time to say "thank you" and "goodbye."

I miss Tom greatly. We have shared Monday lunch together for nearly eight years. At our last lunch together, he looked across the table at me and said, "You're going to do fine. Village has already been blessed with your leadership. Village will keep being Village." I am trusting that he is right.

Some of you have asked some questions. Let me try to answer two of the most common ones.

Why are you still co-pastor? That is still my official title until the Session, and you, decide differently. I know it seems a little odd to be co-pastor without another co-pastor. I am talking with our Personnel Committee and Session about that. It is possible we will look for another co-pastor, but honestly, I am feeling the Spirit leading us away from that. Co-pastors work best when they deeply know and trust one another. Tom and I worked well because we had years of friendship as our foundation (and lots of lunches!). I think it's more likely we will be looking for a senior associate pastor or an executive pastor to help lead us. When the Session decides the time is right, you'll hear from them about a change in my title.



What does it mean that Rev. Chad Herring has been called as interim senior associate pastor? Probably the most significant word in Rev. Herring's title is "interim." When a church calls an interim (e.g., temporary pastor), that is the action of the Session alone. That's what happened with Tom at Fourth Church. The Session alone voted to call Tom, not the whole congregation. Our practice here is when an interim pastor is called, our Personnel Committee meets with the candidate and makes the recommendation to the Session.

Our last interim pastor was Rev. Sally Wright. We needed a pastoral care pastor right away to fill in while we searched for a permanent pastor. Sally was interviewed by the Personnel Committee at Tom's and my recommendation. They recommended Sally be hired and the Session approved. Then, thankfully, Sally was interviewed by the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee, and they recommended to the congregation that she be called and installed, and we voted to call her. I am very glad the Holy Spirit led us to Sally as our interim and then as our permanent pastor!

With Tom's departure we knew we needed help right away, and to our delight, Rev. Chad Herring was available. He had finished eight years serving as senior pastor at John Knox Presbyterian Kirk of Kansas City, Missouri, and most recently, a one-year chaplain residency. He was open to a one-year interim. So, our Personnel Committee, following our process, interviewed him and unanimously recommended to Session that we call him as our interim senior associate pastor. His presence will help me immediately by taking on some of my responsibilities. I am grateful that he's here.

**So, what comes next?** We have formed an Associate Pastor Nominating Committee to search for an associate pastor for young adult ministry and we held a congregational meeting to approve that search. The Session has also approved a search committee for the director of music ministry position. We hope to have both positions filled by this summer.

The comment I have heard most often has been something like: "I am going to miss Tom so much. And I am so glad we have you with us!"

Remember the Hammarskjold quote? For all that is to come, Yes! I look forward to living into that Yes! together!

#### DOCUMENTING OUR HISTORY

#### The Photographer Behind the Village Church Pastor Portraits

Mark McDonald has been taking pictures of Kansas City since 1982 when he graduated from the University of Kansas. "I was going to be a newspaper photographer. There were no jobs available. So, I've been working freelance. It's been the best thing that ever happened."

Mark and his wife, Debby, became members of Village Church in 1990. Over the past 33 years, he has taken all four Village head pastor portraits that line the 2nd floor bridge at the Mission Campus.

"We came to this church because of Dr. Bob Meneilly." Mark recalls, "I was originally hired to take that picture of Dr. Bob for, I think, Ingram's Magazine for an article at the time of influential leaders in Kansas City. That's when I had my first one-on-one time with him. He was just such a gracious and incredibly humble man. We took that in front of the round window in the Sanctuary that is now covered up by the organ."

"Then I took Dr. Bohl, Rev. Tom Are when he first came in 2004, and then Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka this fall. All incredible men. I'm happy to be a part of this church."

Mark's son and daughter grew up at Village. "Both went all the way through this church, were very involved in in the youth groups. I went on Village Youth ski trips for 10 years. I've done three of the mission trips to the Dominican Republic with them."

Mark also plays trumpet in the Village Brass. "I played into college and then quit. And then when my daughter [also a trumpet player] was in high school, we were in church one morning [in 2009] and the brass was playing in the Sanctuary. She said,



'You know, we should do this.' And I said, 'You know, that's great!' She was about 16 years old at the time. And so, for the next however many years until she left for college, we had our standing date on Wednesday nights to go to the rehearsals at Village Brass. How often do you really get to spend that much time with your teenage daughter?" Mark's daughter now lives in Pennsylvania, but he has continued to play in Village Brass. "It's fun. It's a thing I do once a week that's nothing like anything else I do."

Mark's first passion is photography. What does he love so much about it? "That I can actually capture a moment in time," said Mark. "I'm not an art photographer. What I do is more like billboards. You've got to capture somebody's attention in like two seconds as they go by it. I need to clearly communicate something. I just tell stories with pictures instead of words."

Mark has been helping tell the Village story with the pastor portraits that grace The Bridge hallway and other assignments. "It's been fun to be involved with this church. I am incredibly honored to get the chance to document the great mission work that this church does."

#### Mark Your Calendars for Visiting Scholar 2024

Introducing Rev. Dr. Scott Black Johnston, the 2024 Meneilly Visiting Scholar who will lecture at the Village Church Mission Campus on Friday evening, March 8, and Saturday morning, March 9, and preach on Sunday morning, March 10. The program is free and open to the public.

Dr. Johnston is easy to describe by his degrees: B.A. in history and religion (St. Olaf's College); M.Div. (Yale Divinity School); and Ph.D. (Princeton Theological Seminary). He's also easy to describe by the jobs he's held, or as he says, "gigs": senior pastor, Trinity Presbyterian

Church, Atlanta; professor of homiletics, Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary; and currently senior pastor, 5th Avenue Presbyterian Church, in New York City. And he's the author of several books. "Elusive Grace: Loving Your Enemies While Striving for God's Justice" is his most recent.

The title of Dr. Johnston's lecture is "Fight Like Jesus: How Faith Can Inform Conflict." Fight like Jesus!? Is that a thing? Most people training for an upcoming



boxing match probably wouldn't turn to the "Prince of Peace" for tips. Jesus excels at many things. Mixed Martial Arts is not one of them.

On the other hand, Jesus does talk a lot about conflict. Jesus tells story after story about family members who are at odds with each other. He acknowledges that forgiveness is hard for us. He reminds his followers that anger can eat holes in a person's heart. When preaching, Jesus regularly challenges people to treat their neighbors with respect, and yes, he goes way out on

a limb and commands that we love and pray for our enemies.

What do you say? Got conflict in your life? Need a few pointers—a new strategy? Feeling uncertain about whether you even want to walk down a path that could lead to reconciliation?
