Meet Our 2023 Meneilly Visiting Scholar, Dr. Haley Jacob

We're pleased to introduce Dr. Haley Jacob, the 2023 Meneilly Visiting Scholar. Dr. Jacob is associate professor of theology and chair of the theology department at Whitworth University in Spokane, Washington, a Presbyterian affiliated school. She

teaches courses on biblical theology and Paul's epistles. In 2018, "Christianity Today" named her as one of its "10 New or Lesser Known Female Theologians Worth Knowing."

So who is Dr. Haley Jacob? She grew up in the small, rural town of Mazeppa, Minnesota, became a Christian at age 12 and discovered an "insatiable desire" to read the Bible. Nonetheless, she headed to Crown College, St. Bonifacius, Minnesota, with the intent to study medicine and become a pediatric oncologist. However, her love of Bible courses lured her away from medicine and back to theology.

Guided by her love of Biblical studies, after college Dr. Jacob headed to Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary in

Massachusetts, where she earned master's degrees in theology and in New Testament. She spent two summers working at Yellowstone National Park where she added hiking and photography to her list of passions. (Teaching is now also on that list.) While working at Yellowstone, she attended the closest church, Mount Republic Chapel of Peace in Cooke City, Montana—just outside the park entrance. When the church lost its pastor, she was invited to take the position.

This interdenominational church sits at the foot of Mt. Republic and first held services in a saloon when the saloon agreed to close for a few hours on Sunday mornings. Cooke City has about 100 permanent residents. Dr. Jacob says that off-season only 10 persons or so may have been in worship, yet during tourist season there's a need for two services. Dr. Jacob says it was "the strongest

community experience I've ever had, you know everybody very well, and everybody knows you. I loved it."

There Dr. Jacob discovered not only her love of community, but also a love of pastoring. She surmised it would make sense to pursue a seminary degree and was elated when she was accepted into her top choice, the University of St. Andrews (yes, in Scotland), where she earned her Doctorate of Divinity. She reworked her dissertation into book form, "Conformed to the Image of His Son: Reconsidering Paul's Theology of Glory in Romans" (2018), and her new focus is writing a commentary on Colossians.

At some point in her career,

Dr. Jacob found an opportunity to teach English at a college in Biskek, Kyrgyzstan. When she looks back on her nomadic studies and travels, she marvels that for 15 years, she essentially lived out of two suitcases. However, once she accepted a professorship at Whitworth, she soon married, now has two children, ages 2 and 3, and enjoys both her teaching and administrative roles. And since 2015, she's been in one place, no longer living out of suitcases.

So what makes Dr. Jacob so passionate about Biblical studies? Although she has long loved



Bible stories, she says the Bible came alive when she discovered how the New Testament echoes the Old Testament, and she pondered how that should influence our understanding of scripture. She finds echoes of Genesis of 1-3 in Paul's letters, and laughingly recalls she once thought she could understand those echoes in 3-4 years, now realizing it will take a lifetime. Her primary focus is what Paul intended when he wrote we are to be "conformed to the Image of God," repeating the wording of Genesis 1.

She's come to believe God created humans to be God's representatives to Creation, to be God's hands and feet, as Jesus was. And when we don't do this, in essence, we're not behaving as true humans. Stated somewhat differently, we're called to be Holy for a purpose, and that purpose is to be God's representatives on earth. We are not to be conformed to the patterns of the world but to see what God is doing around us and then to jump in and help out. Her passion as a professor is to help young people discover and have confidence in the gifts God gave them, urging them to listen "only to the voices in your life that encourage you to be who God... has made you to be" and find their purpose.

Her ultimate conclusion? Dr. Jacob suggests we're made in the image of God and in becoming a Christian, we're essentially recreated in the image of God's son. "Our original function was to have dominion over the earth, but because of sin, the way humans have ruled led to chaos and destruction. But when we're conformed to the image of God's son, we're brought back to ruling our Creation by representing God in the way that Christ does; through sacrifice, service, love and peace."

FEBRUARY IS BLACK HISTORY MONTH

A Look Back at Village Church History and Civil Rights

In 1965 founding pastor Dr. Bob Meneilly's sermon in support of fair housing caused controversy in the congregation and community. He and his family were threatened. Many church officers and staff members signed a Fair Housing Pledge and gave permission for their names and addresses to be published in the local newspaper.

In a 2012 oral history, Dr. Bob reflected on the impact of his civil rights preaching. "It was very hard for some people. We lost [in] one year probably 300 members," he recalled.

In 1965 and 1966, Dr. Bob delivered several sermons urging his allwhite congregation to welcome

Black residents into their suburban neighborhoods and their church home. These messages prompted several complimentary letters but also a flood of hate mail. Some of those letters and excerpts from Dr. Bob's sermons are on display at the Johnson County Museum in an exhibit about suburban change and race relations in the 1960s.

Here is an excerpt from Dr. Bob's sermon about fair housing, delivered Feb. 14, 1965:

"To segregate a person on the basis of his color is evil because it

penalizes a person for being what God made him and for conditions over which he has no control. If one is segregated because of ignorance, he can learn... if because of poverty, he may improve his economic status... if because of uncleanliness, he can bathe... but if because of race, he is paralyzed. To discriminate against a person because of color is to say to God: 'You made a mistake, God, when you made people of different races.'

We must ensure democracy of housing in this community whatever our inbred emotions say about it. We must act on our Christian convictions—not our pagan prejudices."

In the late 1960s, at Meneilly's urging, Village Church created the Black Motivational Training Center. It helped the poor and marginalized find employment and worked to help trainees cultivate a positive self-image. It remained in existence for more than a decade.
