Will you be a friend among your colleagues in ministry, working with them, subject to the ordering of God's Work and Spirit?

Will you in your own life seek to follow the Lord Jesus Christ, love your neighbor and work for the reconciliation of the world?

Do you promise to further the peace, unity and purity of the church?

Will you seek to serve the people with energy, intelligence, imagination and love?

THE CHURCH'S BOOK (Week of January 7, 2019)

The following daily Bible readings were written by Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka and are offered for your own personal devotion. You are invited to read the text, think about the reflection and questions and allow these to lead you in a time of prayer. Pray for your own journey of faith, pray for Village Church, pray for the community around you, and pray for all of creation.

Monday, Jan. 7

Numbers 18:25-30

The book of Numbers is called "Bemidbar" in Hebrew which translates "in the desert." It describes the life of the Hebrews during their wandering for 40 years between Egypt and the promised land. This passage describes the act of tithing or giving a portion of one's earnings back to God in gratitude. It is remarkable that even while trekking through the desert, the Hebrew people gave gifts to God. Their example teaches us that even in the most challenging times of our lives, we are called to give to God.

Tuesday, Jan. 8

2 Chronicles 32:20-23

Jerusalem is under siege by the Assyrians. King Hezekiah, the prophet Isaiah, and all the people pray to God for deliverance, and God saves them by sending an angel. In response to God's action, they give gifts to God. Like the people of Jerusalem, when we experience God's rescue, we give gifts to God. These gifts can take many forms. The magi gave gold, frankincense and myrrh. We can give God thanks with money or song or any faithful action.

Wednesday, Jan. 9

Proverbs 19:6

The book of Proverbs is a collection of wisdom sayings. This verse reminds us that when you are generous, people will be drawn to you and when you give gifts, all will befriend you. This is true because people like to receive generosity. But there is more to this saying than people receiving. The wisdom here is that generous and gracious people make friends because of their spirit. People are drawn to them because they are magnanimous. God is like that. God's generosity draws us to God.

Thursday, Jan. 10

Matthew 7:7-11

Jesus is teaching and tells his followers not to hesitate to ask God for help. He promises that God will respond to us not because we are deserving but rather because we are God's own children and God, like any loving parent, will be generous. Gifts are given not because the receiver is deserving but more because it is the very nature of the giver. This is who God is to us—a loving, giving parent.

Friday, Jan. 11

Romans 11:25-29

The Apostle Paul is explaining how both Jews and Gentiles can be followers of Jesus. He quotes from Isaiah 59 to remind his readers that the Messiah will come from Israel. They are the elect, the chosen and there is nothing they can do to change that. Once God's gifts and call are given, they are "irrevocable." This is good news! God's grace can never be taken back.

Saturday, Jan. 12

Ephesians 4:1-16

There are three key understandings here about gifts. First, grace itself is a gift from Jesus. Second, we have been given different gifts. Third, all the gifts that have been given are for one purpose: promoting the body's growth in building itself up in love. Remember this. Gifts that are from God build up one another in love. When you build others up in love, you are using your God-given gifts!
