THE CHURCH'S BOOK (Week of April 4, 2016)

The following are daily Bible readings offered for your own personal devotion. You are invited to read the text, think about the reflection and questions and allow these to lead you in a time of prayer. Pray for your own journey of faith. Pray for Village Church and our mission. Pray for God's world.

Monday, April 4

Ephesians 3:14-17

"For this reason... I pray," gives us an indication of Paul's power for unceasing prayer. It is a power that comes solely from God. It is strengthened through Holy Spirit. And it is a recognition that we live in Christ and Christ lives in us. How does prayer empower our life? Is it only a suggestion box? Or, a random list of gratitude? Or, a cry for help? Prayer can be that. But, perhaps our faith rooted and grounded in love, compels us to simply pray, "Christ live in us." Prayer is a reflection of God's active life in our inner life. We pray in order to see and trust that.

Tuesday, April 5

Ephesians 3:18-21

We also pray for "discernment." A word that takes time to comprehend, because it's not about attaining God's knowledge, but rather to know God. The power to comprehend such thought is an act of love. God's love for us and our love for God. God is "far more than all we can ask or imagine." So how is it that we can know God? It is through the "love of Christ," which surpasses all human understanding, and still makes the divine known in human likeness. Wisdom and knowledge are essential, but without love it is nothing.

Wednesday, April 6

Ephesians 4:1-6

Unity in the Spirit and loving one another is what makes for the "bond of peace." Christ is the giver of peace, the ultimate peacemaker. But, as Christians, we are the great troublemakers. All of us share in the life of our Lord through one body, one Spirit, one baptism, one faith, hope and love. Our capacity to model humility, gentleness and patience through disharmony is the mood love takes on. Christ calls for diverse people to put up with each other bearing love, unity and oneness.

Thursday, April 7

Ephesians 4:7-16

The gifts of the Spirit and the Body of Christ are important imagery to our theology. It is just as significant for us to take to heart today, as it was for first century Christians. We who live in Christ must seek to "speak the truth in love," working as a unified body to do the diverse ministry of Christ. We submit to a living Lord who calls for love and unity. Unity in Christ is a cosmic reality and a human one, and it calls us to love one another.

Friday, April 8

Ephesians 4:17-24

There is a common understanding in our faith of turning from the old life toward the future new life. In Ephesians, this seems to be directly connected with being part of the Body of Christ. In its own context this letter is probably speaking directly to Gentiles becoming a part of the Christian community. The old life must be put away, life separated from God, and the new life, life in the Body of Christ, must be put on like new clothes. This is not a human decision or event, clothing ourselves in new life is an act of God.

Saturday, April 9

Ephesians 4:25-5:2

This new life in Christ is seen through Christian unity and love manifested in forgiveness and tenderheartedness. These words give some strong suggestions on those old life things that need to be put away, and what new life really looks like. The Christian life is primarily seen in human actions and not in the spiritual state of the soul. We are not removed from the troubles of this life. We are called to take on the troubles of the world, of community, with these examples of Christian love.

School of Theology - Religion in America: Billy Graham to Marcus Borg - The class is an exploration of developments in mainline and evangelical Protestantism in the latter half of the 20th century focusing on Billy Graham and Marcus Borg. Readings will include Grant Wacker's book, *America's Pastor*, and Borg's classic, *Meeting Jesus Again*. Classes will include discussions of videos and readings including some of Graham's most famous crusades and Borg's two appearances at Village Church in 2003 and 2007.
