ABOUT TODAY'S SERVICE

In his commentary on today's Bible passage from Luke's Gospel, Fred Craddock, professor of preaching and New Testament at Emory University, writes: "The everyday activity of home and marketplace, farm and fishing boat, provided Jesus with not only revelations of the true character of his listeners, but also opportunities to reveal the way of life in the reign of God. The Greek historian Plutarch once observed that it is in the small, apparently trivial act that character is most accurately reflected. And if the incarnation teaches us anything, it is that the frequent and familiar are not to be overlooked in defining life in the presence of God. Therefore, those who treat these verses lightly as just a bit of social commentary by Jesus have missed the meaning. The subject here is the kingdom of God."

THE CHURCH'S BOOK (Week of July 18, 2016)

The following are daily Bible readings offered for your own personal devotion. You are invited to read the text, think about the reflection and questions and allow these to lead you in a time of prayer. Pray for your own journey of faith. Pray for Village Church and our mission. Pray for God's world.

Monday, July 18

Philippians 1:1-11

Paul writes to the Philippian congregation and remembers their past with them. You have shared in the gospel from the first day until now. Faith is like that. There are those in our past who have strengthened us. Who is that for you? Who would speak of you as one who shares in the faith with them?

Tuesday, July 19

Philippians 1:12-18

The Philippians are worried about Paul because he is in jail. But he tells them that he is all right. The gospel is being proclaimed. Of course, he would like to be out of jail, but what is most important is that he is able to live his faith. Even in the harshest moments of our lives, living our faith gives us comfort. Life can take much from us, but never the opportunity to be faithful.

Wednesday, July 20

Philippians 1:19-30

Paul sees his options from prison. He will die there. If so, Christ is still Lord. So Paul is not afraid. If he is released, he will rejoin this congregation in ministry. That is his joy. Either way, there is nothing to fear. When you find yourself free from fear, nothing in the world can destroy you.

Thursday, July 21

Philippians 2:1-13

God is at work in you. The description of Christ in this passage is one of humility. Such humility may seem to be evidence of the absence of God, but Paul speaks to the contrary...this is the power of God at work in Christ and in us.

Friday, July 22

Philippians 2:19-31

This is a passage about friendships. These people love each other. When they can see one another, there is reason to rejoice. Who are the people who fill your heart? What are your reasons for rejoicing today?

Saturday, July 23

Philippians 3:12-4:1

Paul does not speak of the gospel as a single moment experience; he is pressing on. Every day brings new opportunities to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. Paul, even in prison, knows that he is not alone, for others are pressing on as well. It is important for us all to remember that we are not alone in our Christian journey.
