THE CHURCH'S BOOK (Week of December 12, 2016)

The following daily Bible readings were written by Dr. Rodger Nishioka and are an offering for your own personal devotion. In this Advent season as we await the birth of the Christ child, these scriptures are drawn from the text written by Charles Jenner for the oratorio *Messiah* by George Frederic Handel composed in 1741. Listen to a recording as you read and pray through this week.

Monday, Dec. 12

Isaiah 40:1-4

The voice of a tenor opens Handel's oratorio with these beautiful words. They are words of comfort for Hebrews whose nation has been conquered and are living in exile in Babylon. There, as strangers in a distant land, they are bereft and wonder whether they will ever see their home again. These are words of comfort, too, for we who anticipate the coming of the birth of Christ, the savior of the world.

Tuesday, Dec. 13

Isaiah 40:5

The first chorus of *Messiah* is this wondrous verse. The message is three fold. First, God is about to reveal God's glory. This is God's doing and not our own. We have done nothing to deserve this. Second, the revelation of God's glory will be seen by all people, not simply a select few. And finally, in similar ways to God speaking creation into being (And God said, "Let there be light" in Genesis 1:3), God speaks Jesus into being. Listen. What is God speaking to you today?

Wednesday, Dec. 14

Isaiah 53:4-6

Isaiah makes much of the "suffering servant" theme and these two choruses early in the second movement remind us that another has borne the weight of our sinfulness, our straying from God. Like sheep, Isaiah writes and the chorus sings, we tend to stray from God. It is our sinful nature. We cannot save ourselves. We need another who is willing to suffer on our behalf. Quiet your soul on this day and give thanks to God for the life of Jesus, the suffering servant, who bore our sins even to death.

Thursday, Dec. 15

Zechariah 9:9-12

This is great news! The prophet Zechariah calls on the people to rejoice. They have returned to their land after exile in Babylon and are beginning to reconstruct the holy temple so that God may once again have a home. Part of Handel's genius is his ability to compose a score that so powerfully captures the text. This soprano solo is an example of that. Listen as her voice lifts from note to note. The tune gives the singer and listener a sense of joy!

Friday, Dec. 16

Job 19:23-27

Job is a pawn in a cosmic battle between Satan and God. Satan tells God that, of course, Job is faithful because he has a rich life. So God allows Satan to hurl all kinds of suffering at Job – the loss of his family, wealth, status, and his health. In the midst of his tragedies, Job has the courage to make this incredible faith claim: "For I know that my Redeemer lives." This is sung by a soprano to open the third movement. In all situations in life, may we also be able to make such a bold claim!

Saturday, Dec. 17

Revelation 19:6-16

The story goes that when King George II first heard the orchestra and chorus sing "Hallelujah" at the close of the second movement, he stood up. Since the king stood up, all in the building stood, too. "Hallelujah" is a Hebrew term meaning "praise Yahweh," and in the New Testament it occurs only in Revelation. This moving chorus praises God at Christ's second coming, and it is frequently sung at Christmas and Easter. It will be performed tomorrow afternoon by the Village Church Choir and Orchestra at the Tidings of Joy celebration. Let us all remember Christ's birth and his second coming and praise God!

Note: A marvelous and very readable small book about the scriptures and Handel's *Messiah* is titled: *Every Valley* compiled by Jessica Miller Kelley and published in 2014 by Westminster/John Knox Press. A copy is in the church library. Check it out.
